Note: CASA Manual of Standards Part 139 amendment has been issued, scheduled to be implemented on: 20/08/2020. Changes may impact project AIM. Currently reviewing design criteria and impact assessment of changes to Airfield.

 Brief scope includes developing a parcel of land for the relocation of tenancies located within Transition Estate sites. Works overview includes bulk earth works, roadworks, drainage, sewer reticulation 			
and site services.			
Works permit issued by the ABC.			
 Prestart meeting held with the civil contractor OM Civil on 8 October 2019. Date for practical completion is 20 December 2019.
